Type of Case Study	This project was based on the development of an international volunteer programme for 'hands-on' habitat management for adults of all ages working with the local university and members of the local bird society.
	Community engagement, working with the local university and local bird society, benefits local wetland conservation work.
Introduction to the Case Study	The programme consisted of lectures, a guided tour and practical conservation action working with local people. The overall aims were to improve the habitat through the removal of an invasive grass and to encourage young people to take action for nature conservation.
What was done and when and where did you do it?	 Removed invasive cordgrass (Spartina alterniflora) spreading into Gaomei wetland, Taiwan, an IBA site of approximately 550 square metres. 56 Japanese volunteers and over 500 Taiwanese volunteers participated in the conservation work through Green Holiday 2014 and 2015. In a classroom setting with local university students, the volunteers learnt about wetland wildlife and the considerable effort that has to be made to protect wildlife.

What was the result of the action?	The concept of Green Holiday was shared with the Taiwanese volunteers and a locally based Green Holiday has project has now been launched by the Wild Bird Association of Taiwan in collaboration with Ecotourism Taiwan for the protection of Gaomei wetland through the removal invasive cordgrass (<i>Spartina Alterniflora</i>). Young people, including university students, continue to be interested in joining this activity.
