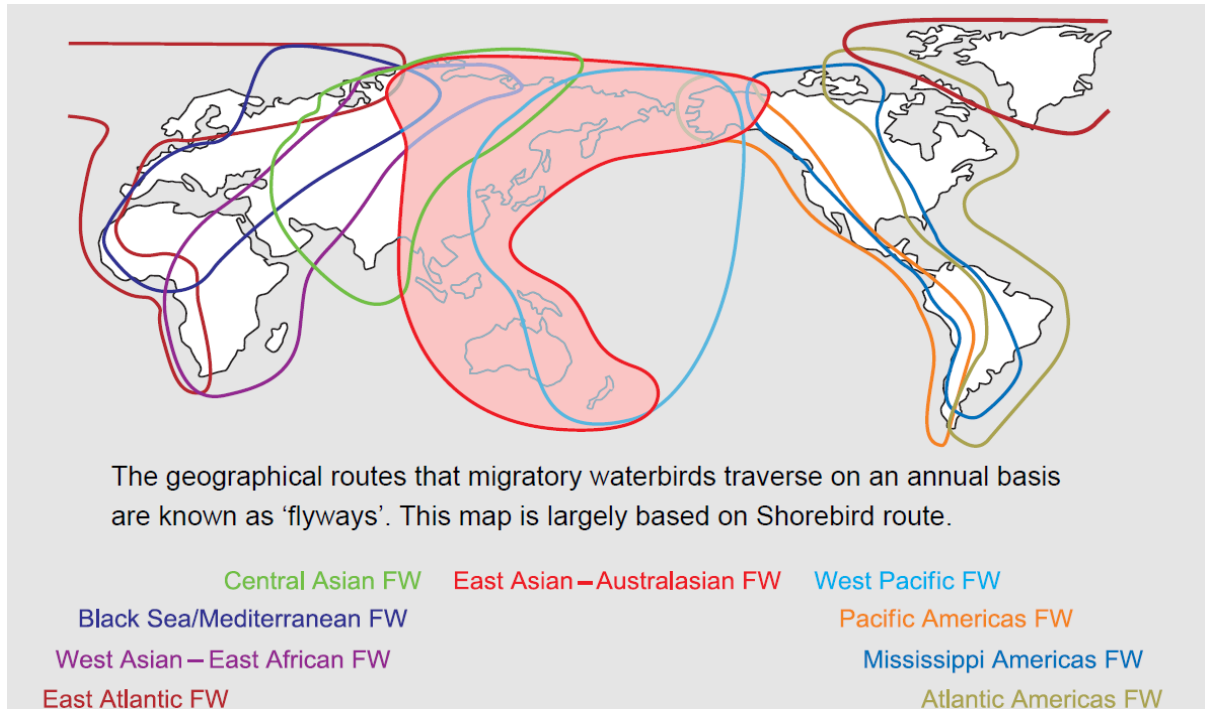

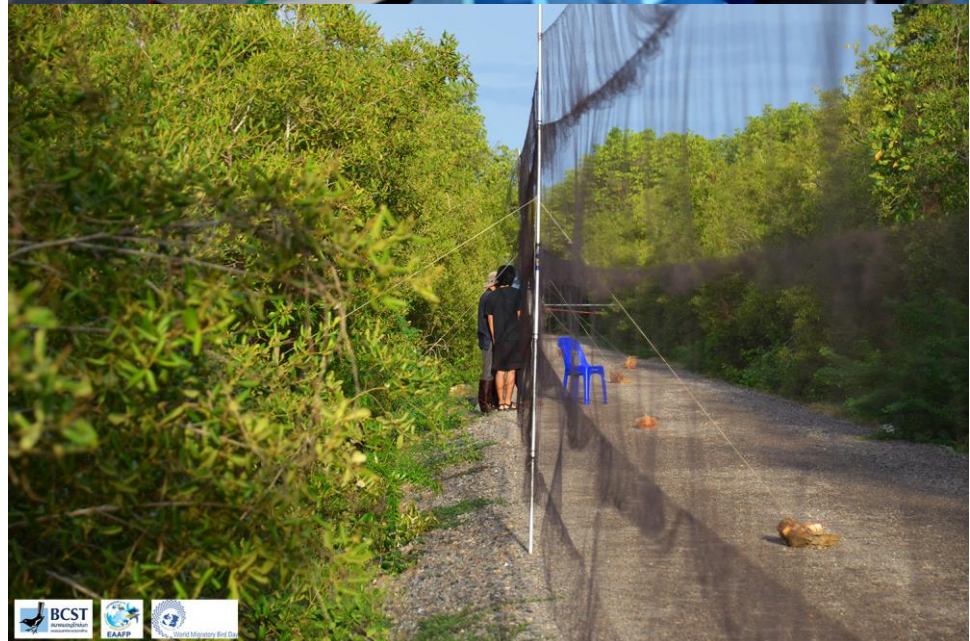

3. SHORT SUMMARY REPORT

The workshop was held at two venues; Phetchaburi Rajabhat University and Laem Phak Bia Environmental Research and Development Project (LERD) both in Phetchaburi province, approximately two hour-drive from Bangkok. The first day of the workshop was spent in a lecture room at Phetchaburi Rajabhat University where it was filled with almost 50 participants. Many participants were children and university students from the birding club at Phetchaburi Rajabhat University. Others were birdwatchers, mostly younger generations, as well as staff from LERD where bird ringing sessions are regularly carried out and staff from ONEP. Lecturers included experts on bird ringing, as well as a representative from ONEP who gave a talk about the importance of Laem Phak Bia-Pak Thale area and the importance of flyway network sites. We felt grateful to have Philip D. Round from Mahidol University to give a talk about the importance of bird ringing as he is Thailand's foremost ornithologist who has been ringing and studying birds in

Thailand for more than 20 years. It was also great to have two other expert bird ringers from both governmental authority (Bung Boraphet Wildlife Research Station in Nakhon Sawan province; under the Department of National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation) and private sector (Nam Kham Nature Reserve in Chiang Rai province) to share their knowledge with us.

The second day of the workshop was held at LERD where we demonstrated how bird ringing session is done. There were approximately 30 people attending on the second day. All have participated in the lectures on the first day. Although we could only catch 3 individuals throughout the morning, all participants got to observe every process of bird ringing and studying birds in hand. The three individuals included a Golden-bellied Gerygone (*Gerygone sulphurea*), Common Tailorbird (*Orthotomus sutorius*) and Brown-throated Sunbird (*Anthreptes malacensis*). There would be much higher chance of catching more birds during migration period.

The event was free of charge for participants and the budget was spent as proposed. The lectures on the first day was open to public, while the field bird ringing session on the second day was for BCST members. We are thankful to EAAFP for sponsoring the event, as well as Phetchaburi Rajabhat University and LERD for allowing us to use their facilities and hold the event.
